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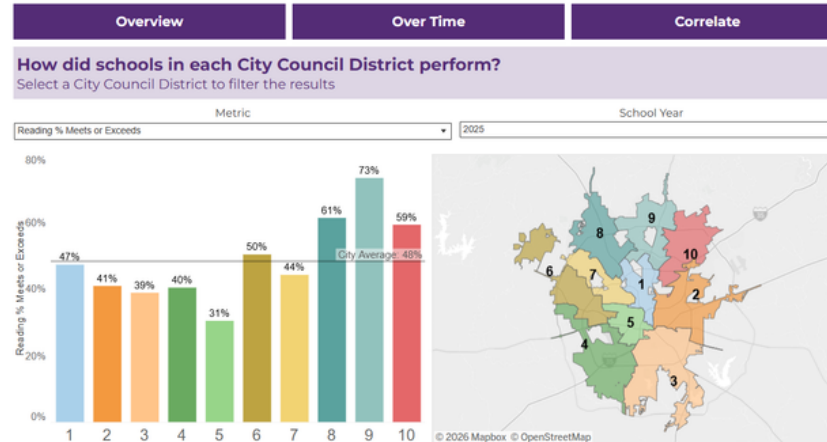
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About the Report

The 2026 Student Learning Report analyzes STAAR reading and math results for San Antonio students in grades 3–8. It begins with a citywide overview before examining performance across each City Council district, including proficiency levels, and changes over time. Each district section also identifies bright spot schools that serve high percentages of students eligible for free or reduced-price lunch and perform above the citywide average. Together, these examples highlight what is working locally and offer lessons for expanding strong outcomes to more students across San Antonio.

Letter from the CEO

Dear Friends and Partners,

Meaningful change does not happen by accident. It happens when people decide that the future our children deserve is worth building and then choose to build it together. That is the spirit we bring to this year's Student Learning Report: not resignation or blame, but honest reflection and shared responsibility for what comes next.

This year's STAAR data shows that San Antonio is making progress in reading and math, but not fast enough. We should acknowledge the gains because they represent real work happening in classrooms across our city from teachers, school leaders, families, and students who continue striving to achieve. But we cannot confuse movement with momentum, or slight gains with the level of transformation our children deserve.

Within this same data, there are signs of what is possible when intention and commitment meet.

One of the clearest signs of progress is in San Antonio's urban core. Students inside Loop 410 have made a 6-point gain in math since 2022, outpacing both the citywide gain and state gain over the same period. In a part of our city where students have historically faced some of the greatest barriers to opportunity, this matters. It tells us that progress is not reserved for some children, some neighborhoods, or some school models. It is happening here.

The report also shows that campus charters are one of the strongest sustained improvement stories in the city. These in-district charter campuses, which include all 1882 partnership schools, increased from 19% to 31% proficiency in math and from 34% to 44% proficiency in reading since 2022. That matters because it shows that schools serving some of our highest-need communities can produce meaningful academic gains, and that innovative partnerships within public school systems have an important role to play in San Antonio's education ecosystem.

We also continue to see that high-quality school options matter for families. Inside Loop 410, both open-enrollment charters and in-district charter campuses outperformed traditional schools in math and reading. These are different school models, but together they reinforce a larger promise: families deserve access to excellent public schools in every form, and our city should be humble and bold enough to learn from every model that is helping students succeed.

Across San Antonio, schools and systems are already showing what stronger outcomes can look like. Multiple operators outperformed the state in math, including Southside ISD, Eleanor Kolitz Hebrew Language Academy, and the School of Science and Technology. In reading, North East ISD, BASIS Texas, and nine other operators also exceeded the state. New Frontiers Public Schools posted the city's highest one-year math growth, with a 25-percentage-point gain, while South San ISD stands out among ISDs for a five-point reading gain in one year. East Central ISD also stands out as the city's most-improved school district since 2022. Every East Central ISD campus has made gains in both reading and math over that period, with schools improving by an average of 16 percentage points in reading and 13 percentage points in math.

If we want citywide change, we must think and work differently. That means school leaders, nonprofit leaders, local elected officials, funders, and employers starting conversations with people they may not have previously considered partners. It means sitting at new tables, asking harder questions, and testing better ideas that can move outcomes at scale. This is how San Antonio moves from pockets of progress to a broader promise for every child.

As you read this report, we ask you to see more than data points. See the students behind them, the educators working for them, the schools proving that more is possible, and the unfinished work in front of us.

San Antonio's children cannot wait for change to arrive on its own. They deserve leaders who will move with urgency now. City Education Partners is ready to stand alongside those willing to imagine boldly, partner differently, and expand opportunity for San Antonio students.

The call is clear. What comes next depends on how we rise together.

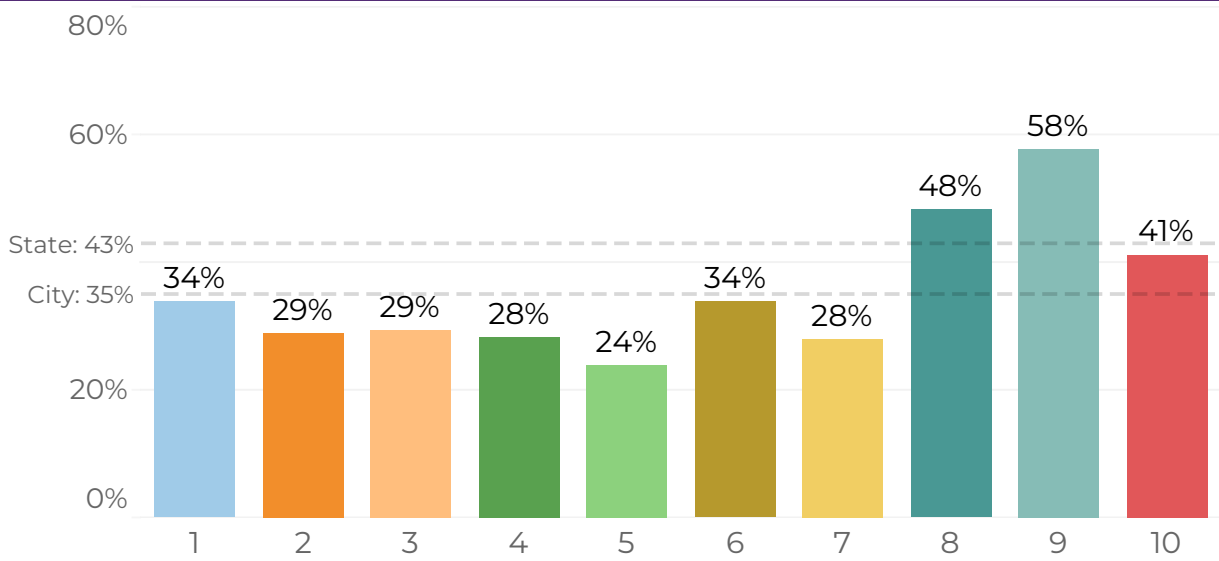

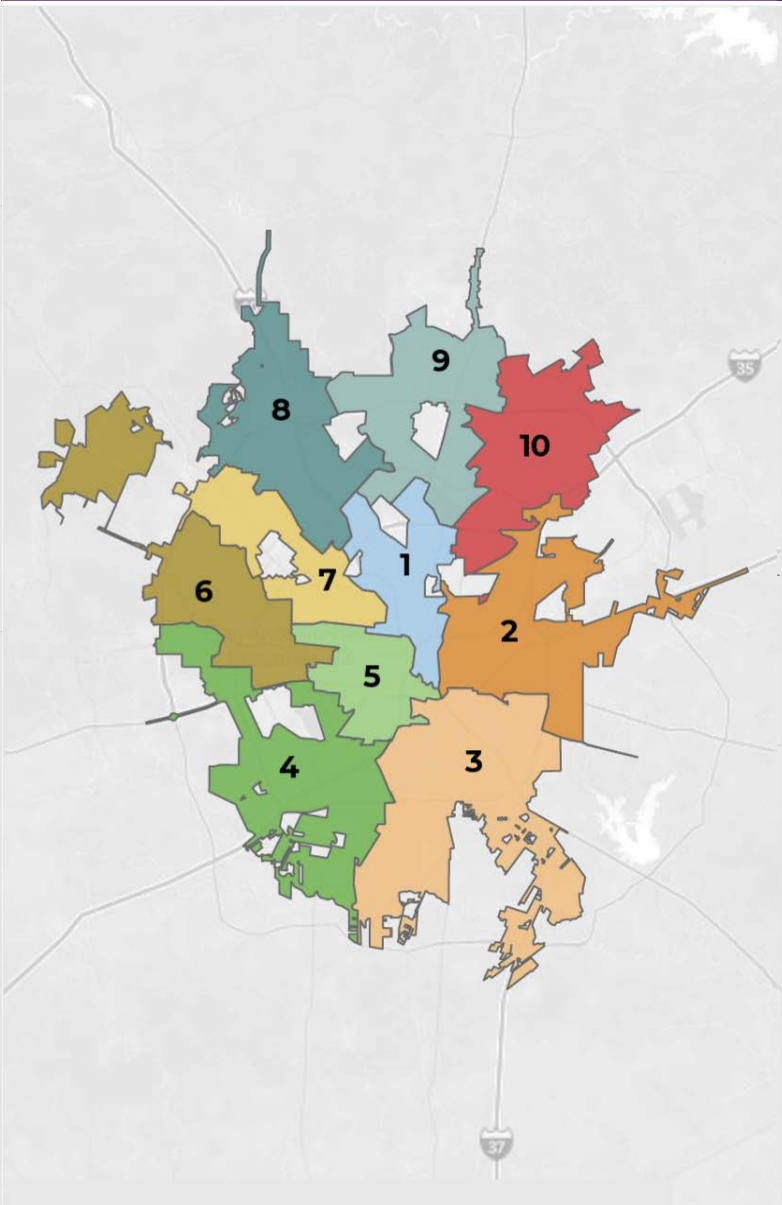
Reading Proficiency by City Council District

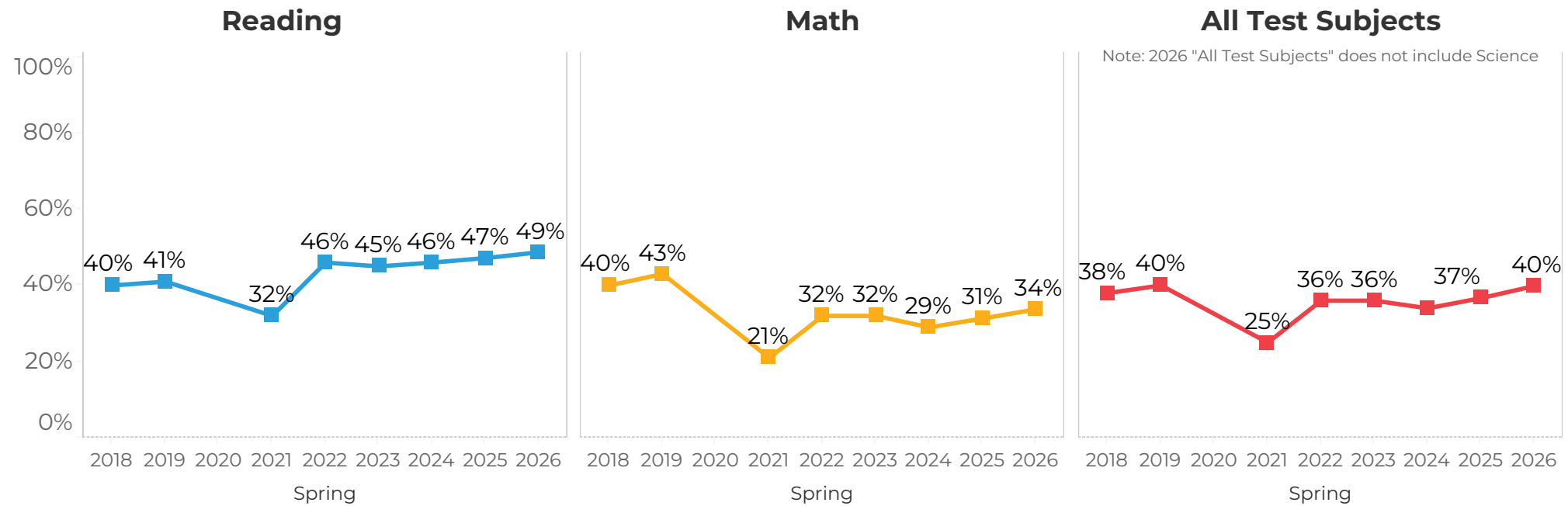

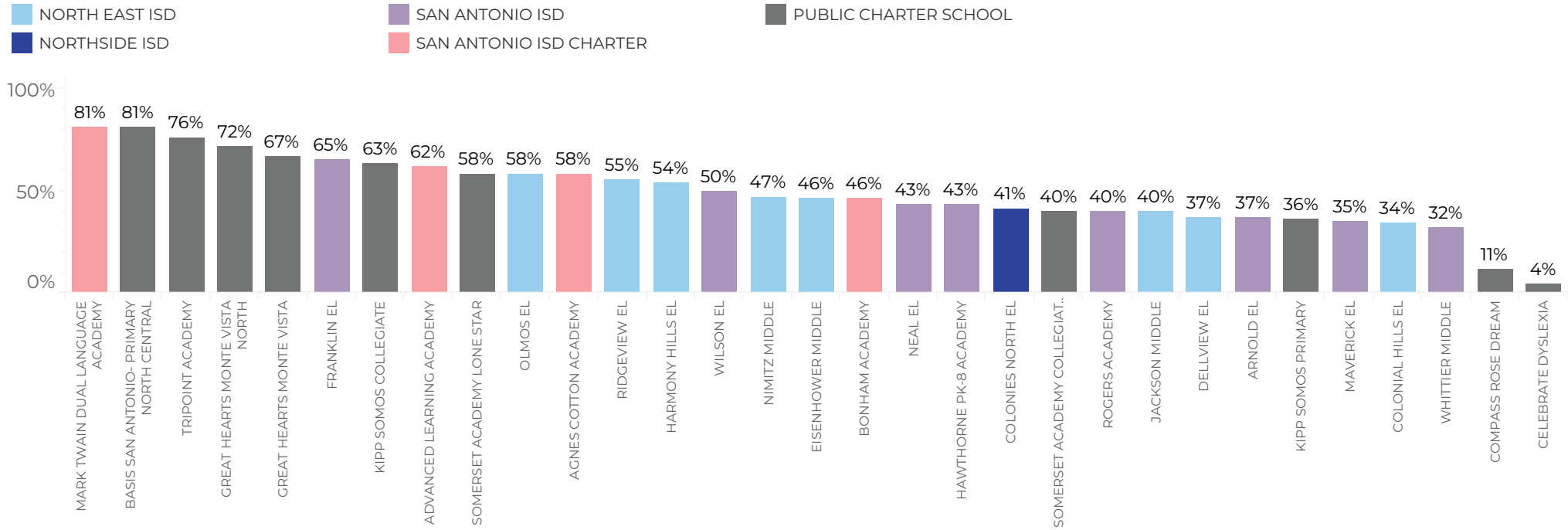

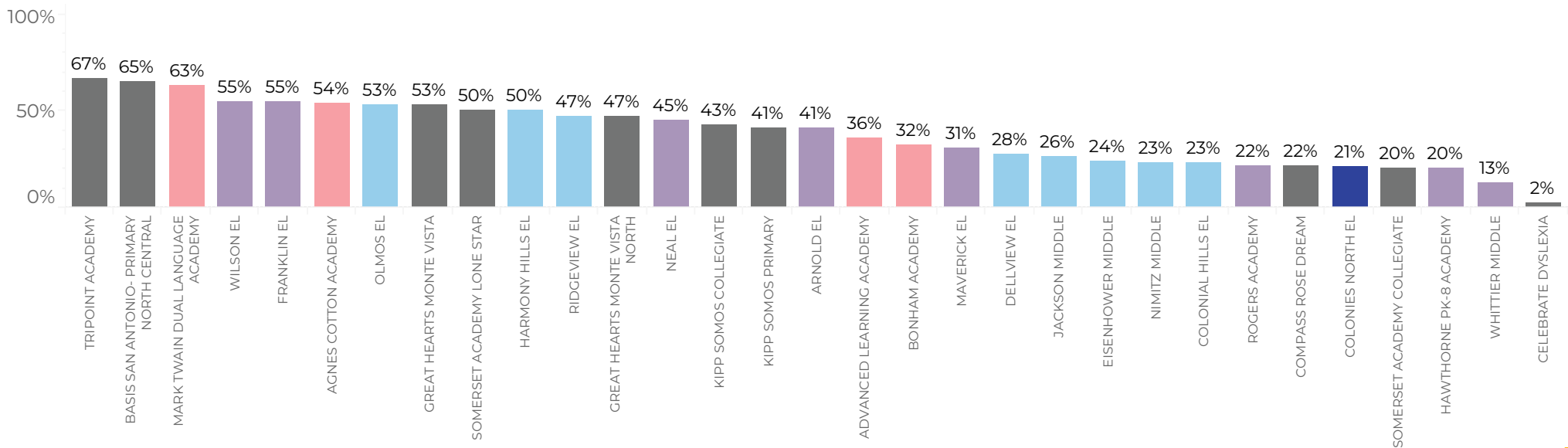

Percentage of Students at or Above Meets Grade Level Standard in Reading

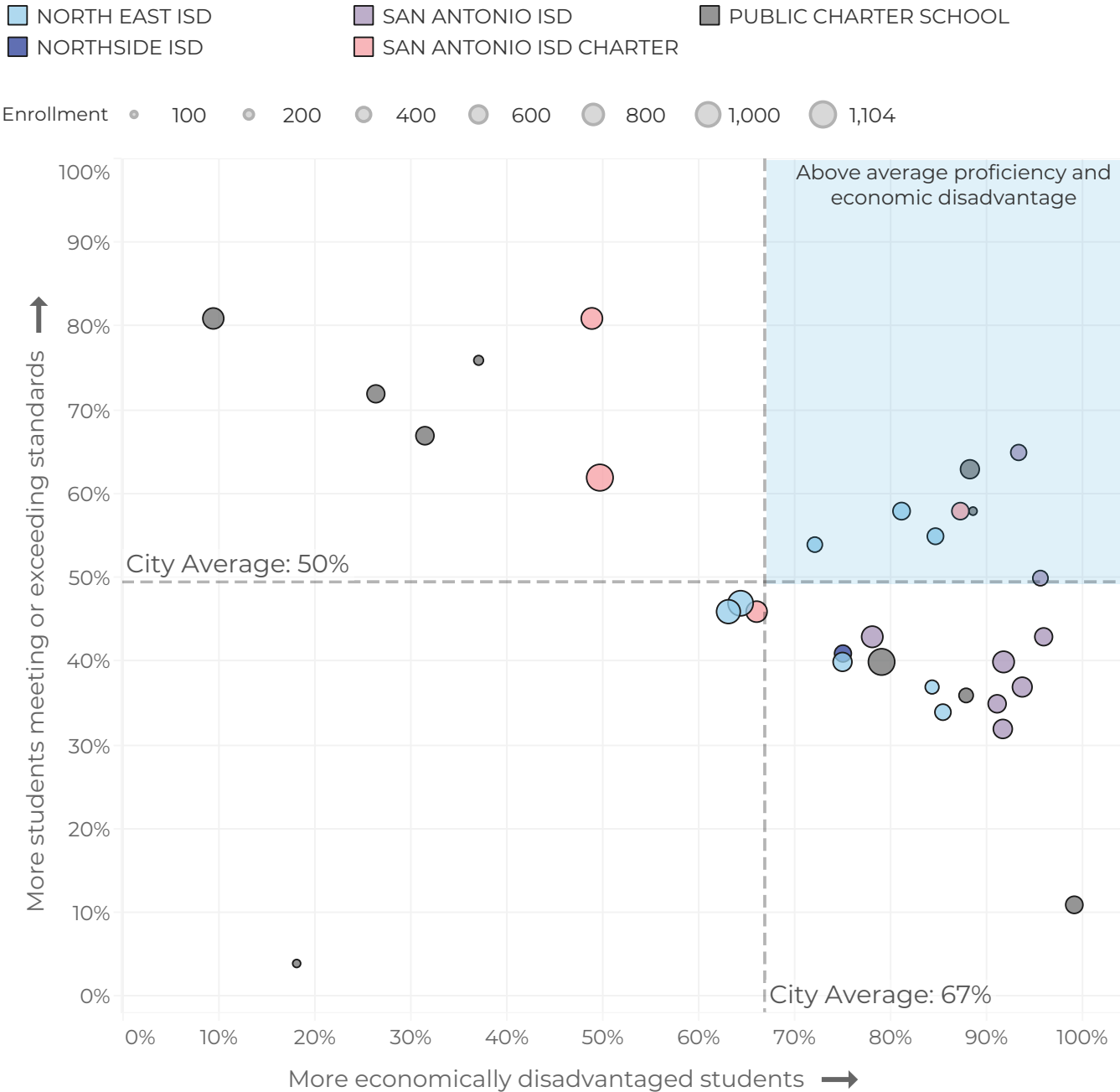


Percentage of Students at or Above Meets Grade Level Standard in Math

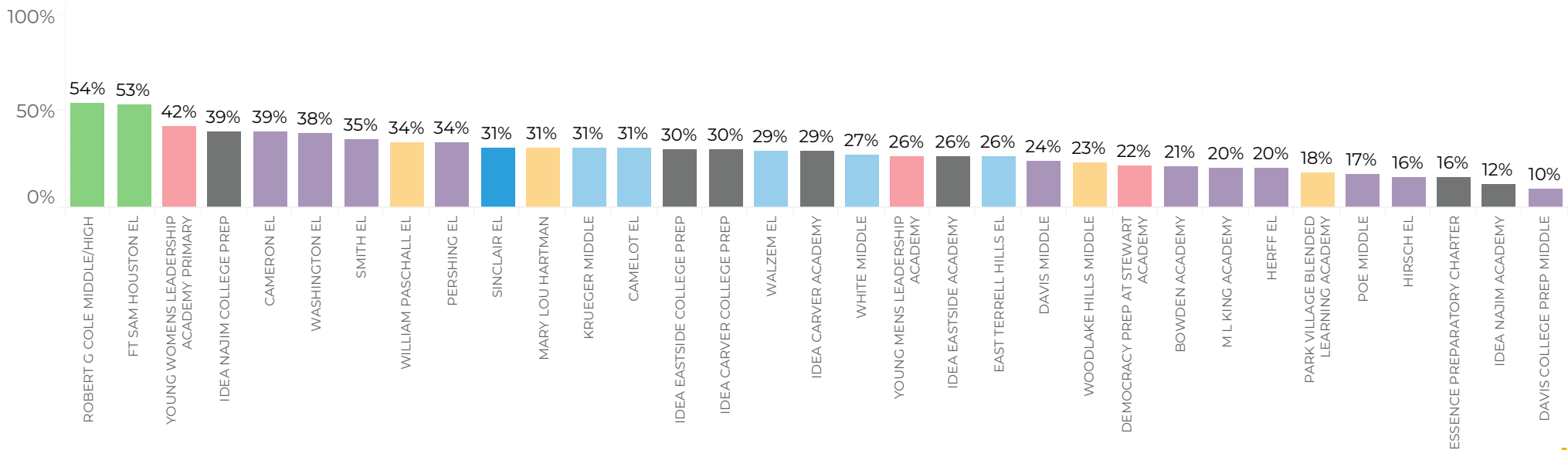


San Antonio City Council District 2

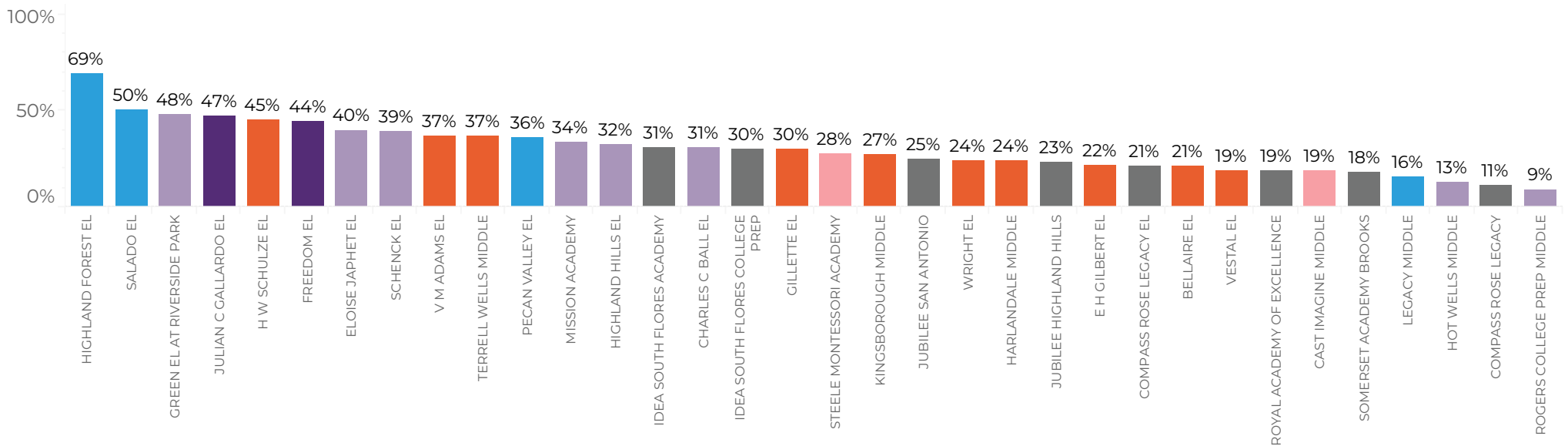


San Antonio City Council District 3

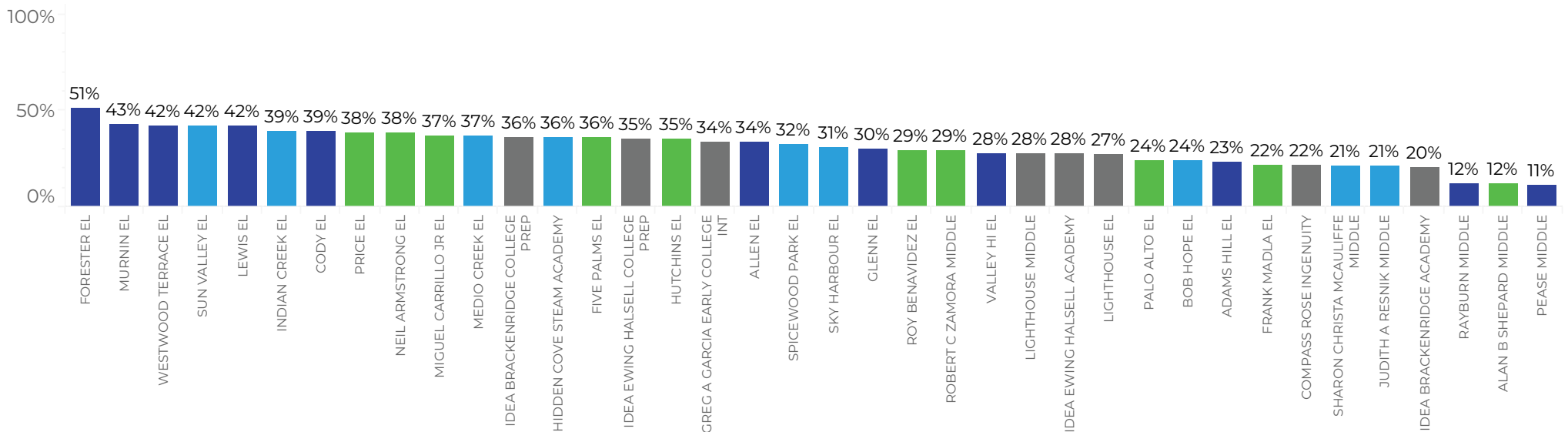


San Antonio City Council District 4

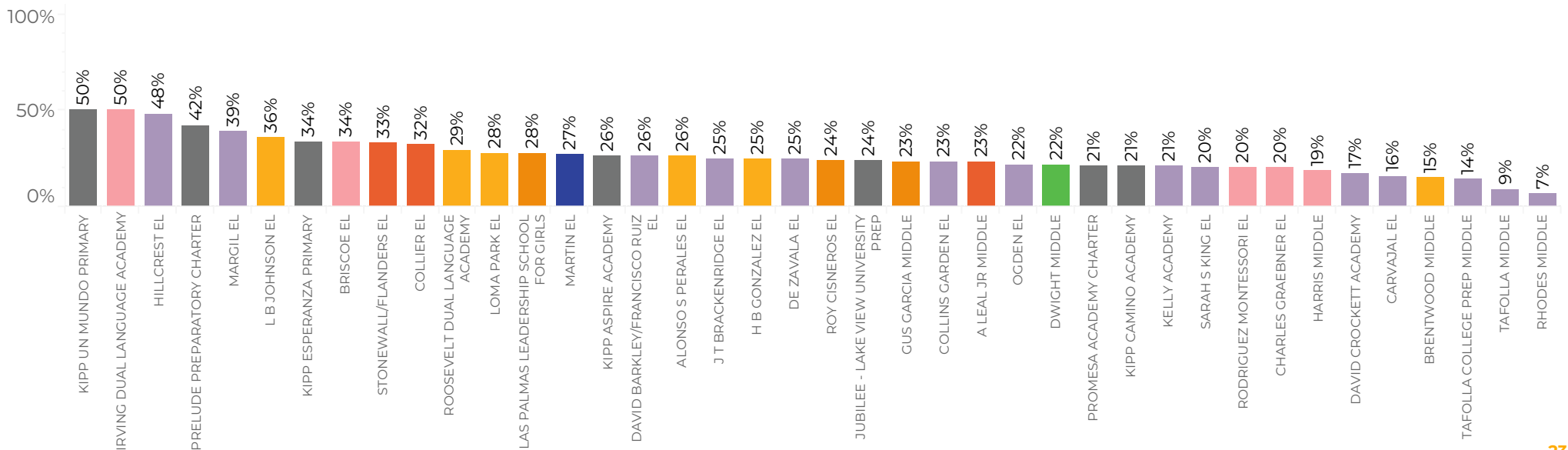


San Antonio City Council District 5

Percentage of Students at or Above Meets Grade Level Standard in Math

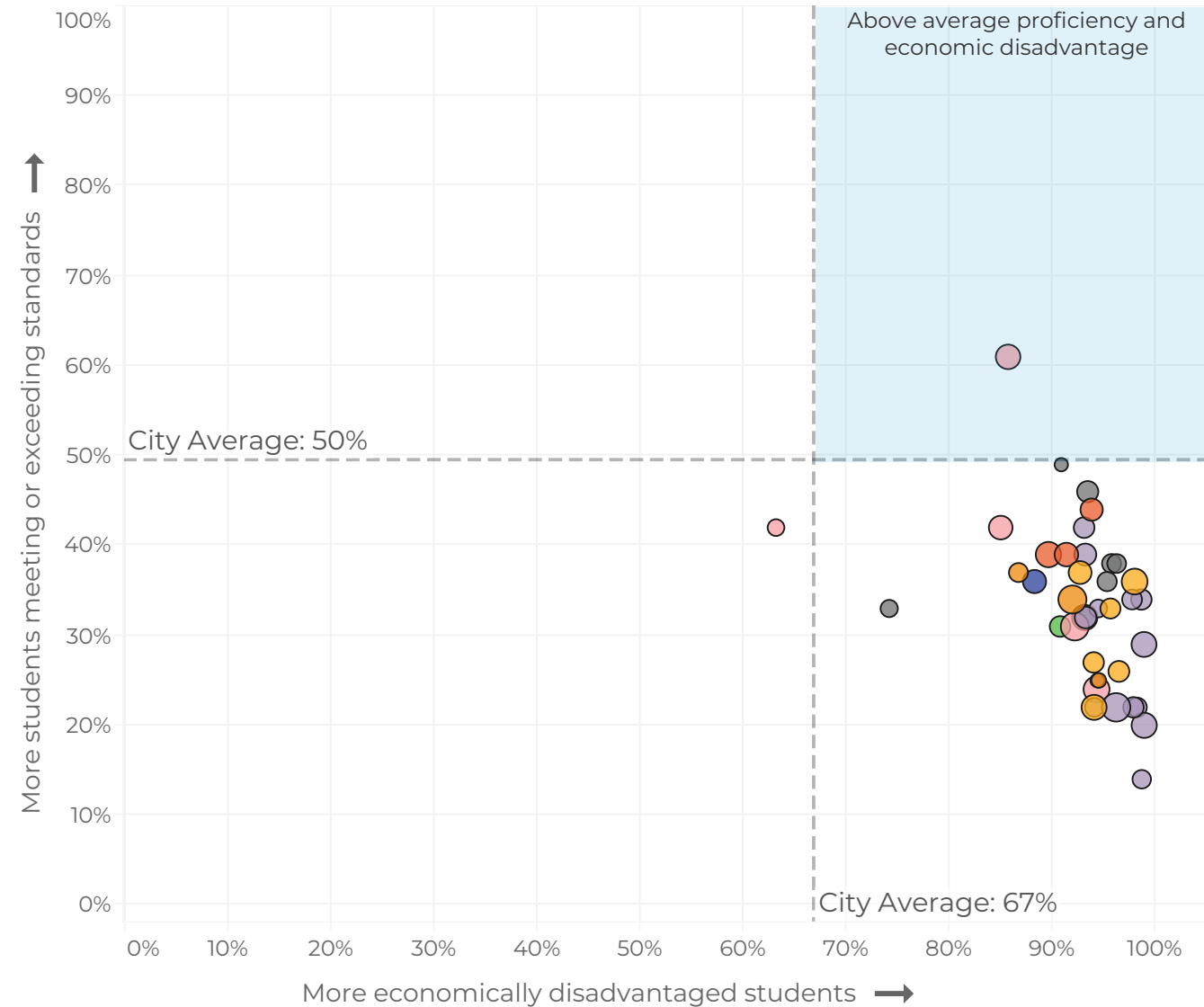

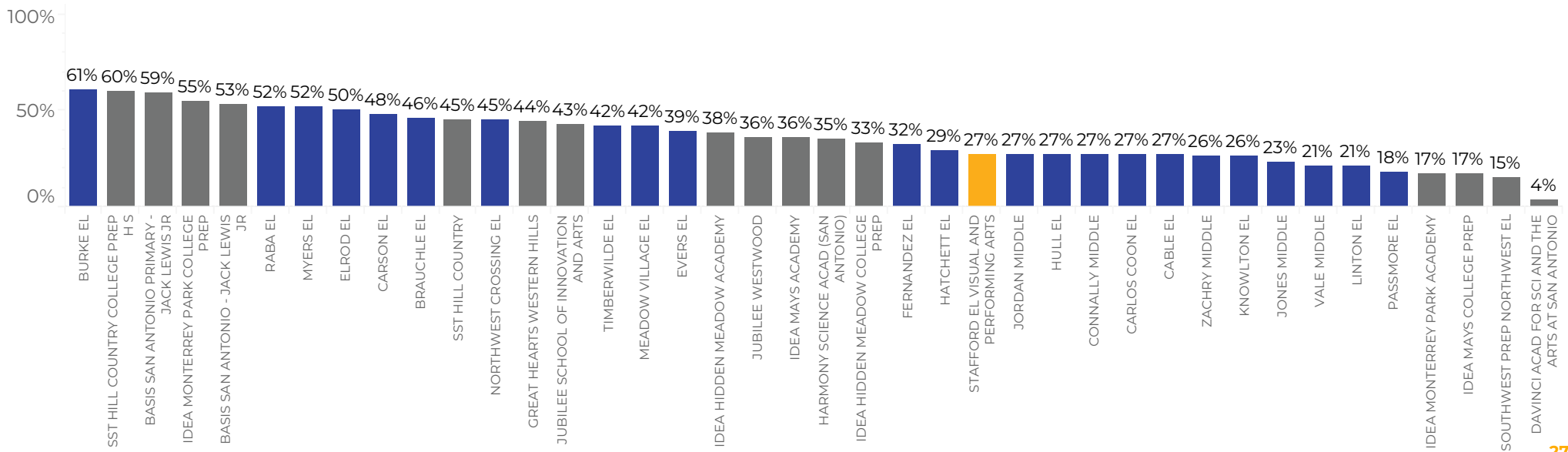


San Antonio City Council District 6

Percentage of Students at or Above Meets Grade Level Standard in Math

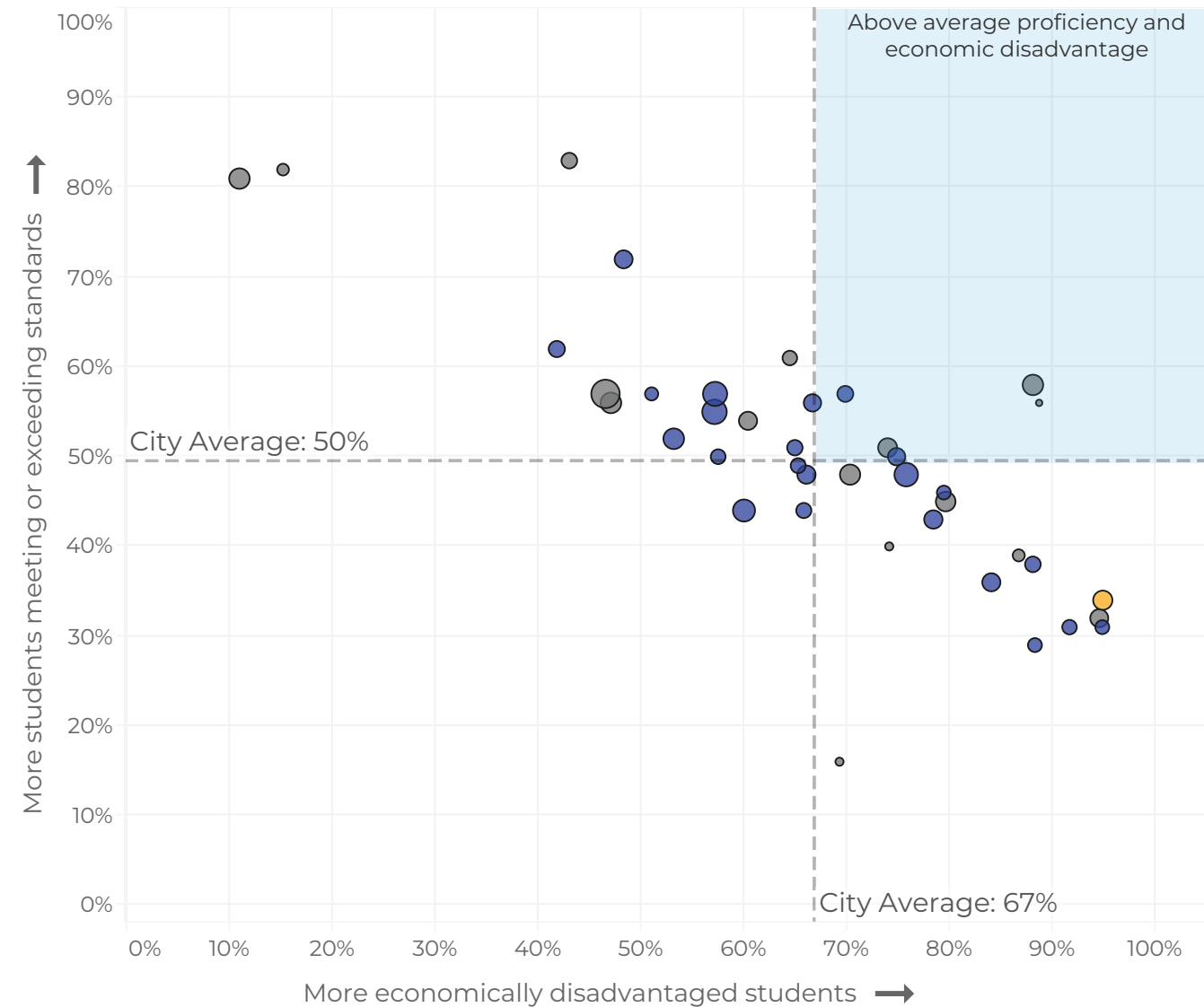

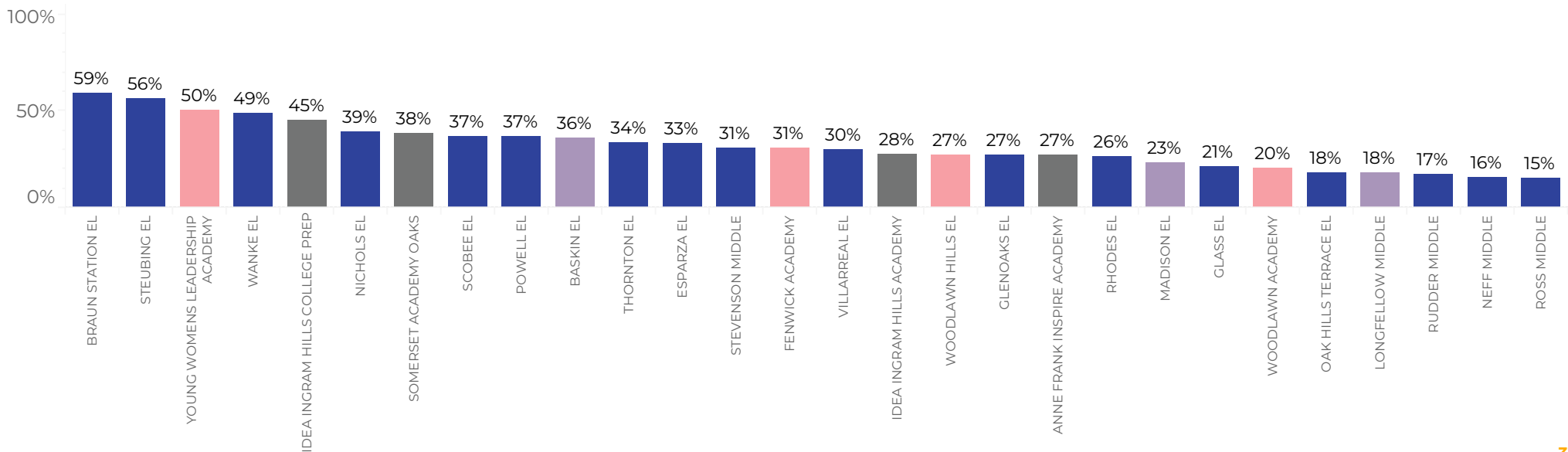


San Antonio City Council District 7

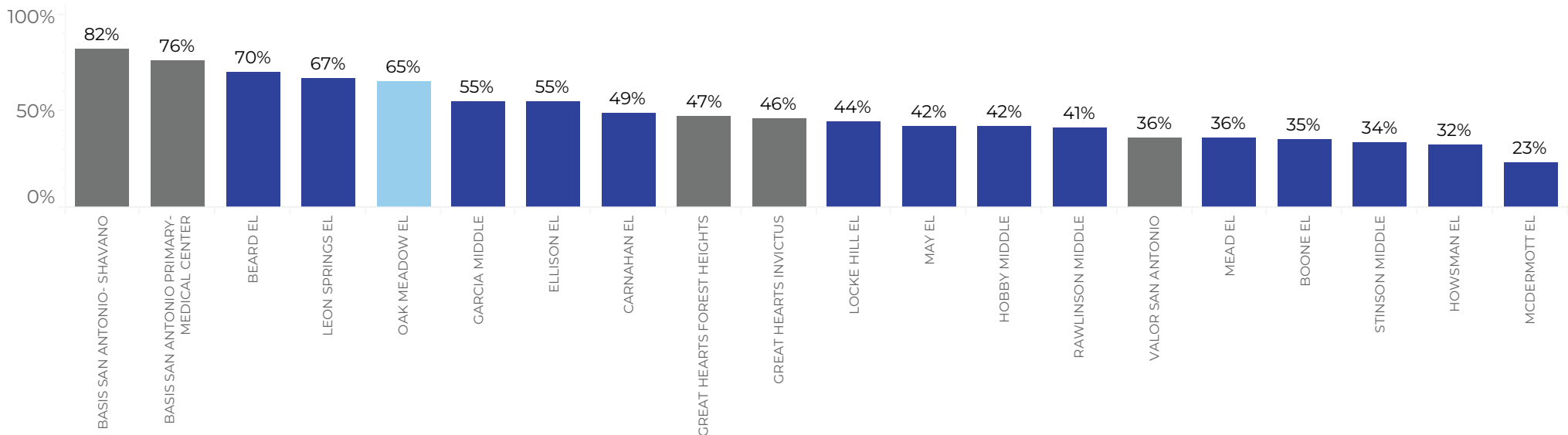


San Antonio City Council District 8

Percentage of Students at or Above Meets Grade Level Standard in Math

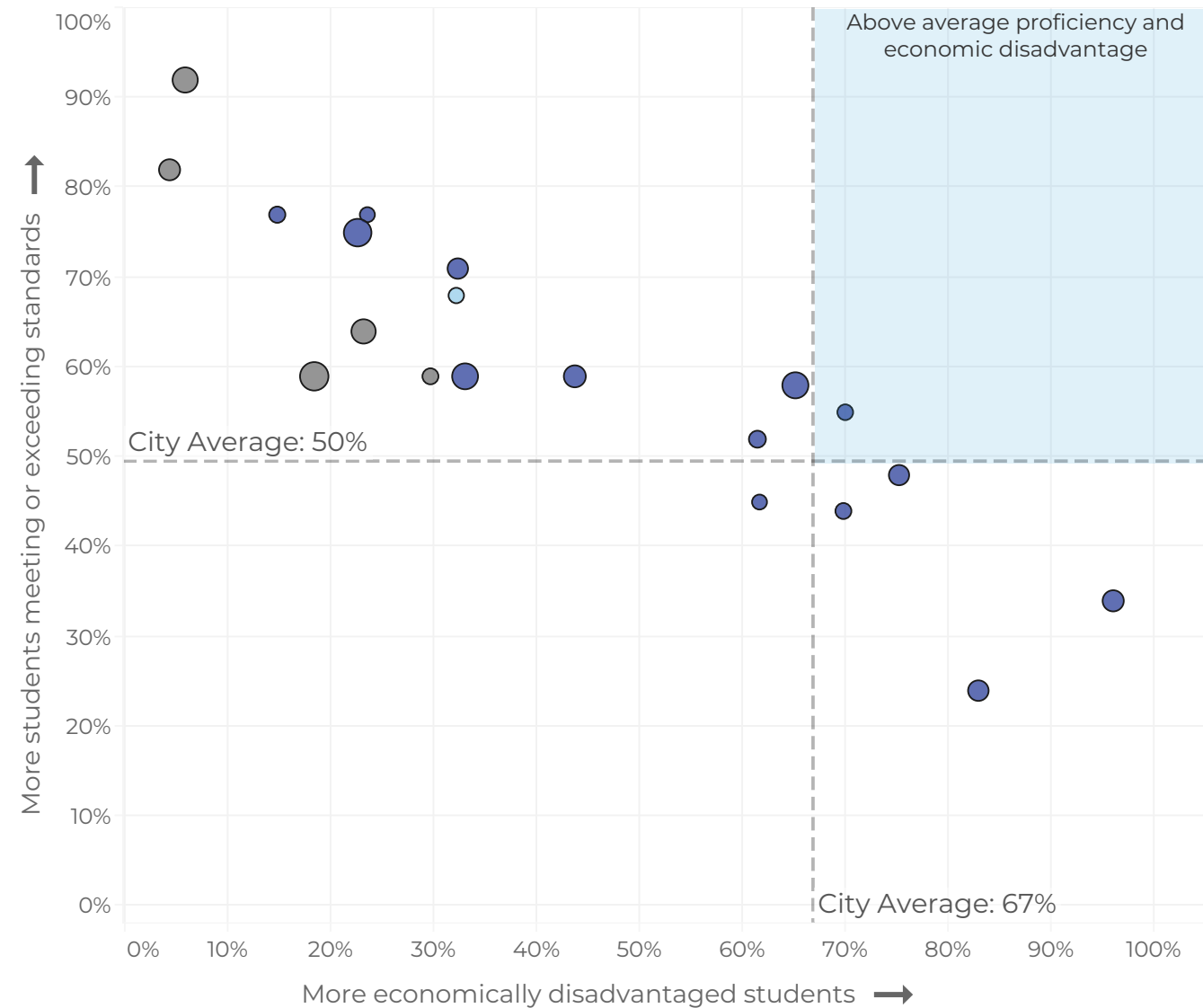

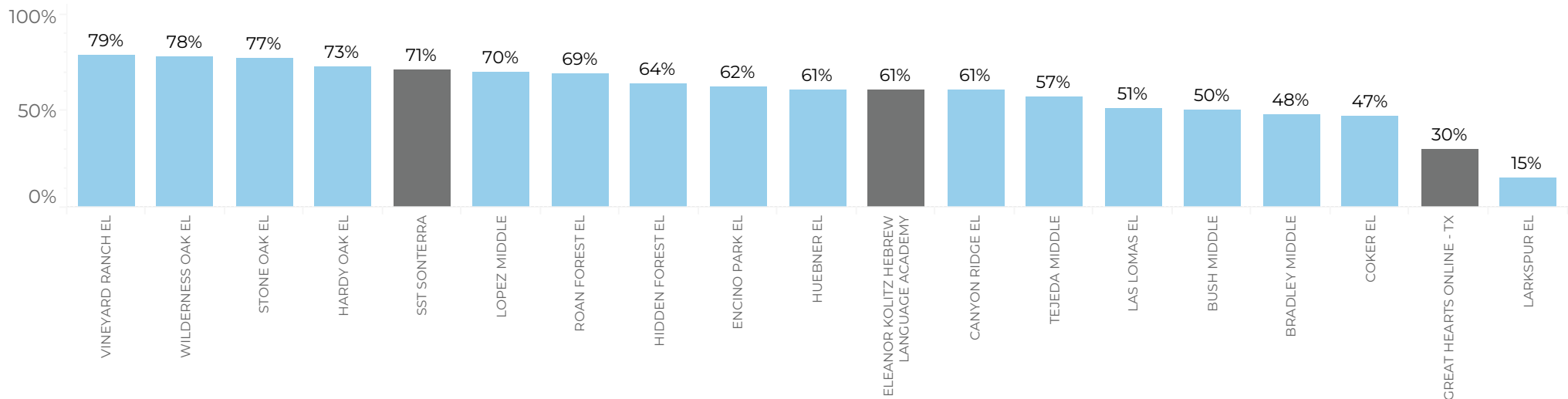


San Antonio City Council District 9

Percentage of Students at or Above Meets Grade Level Standard in Math

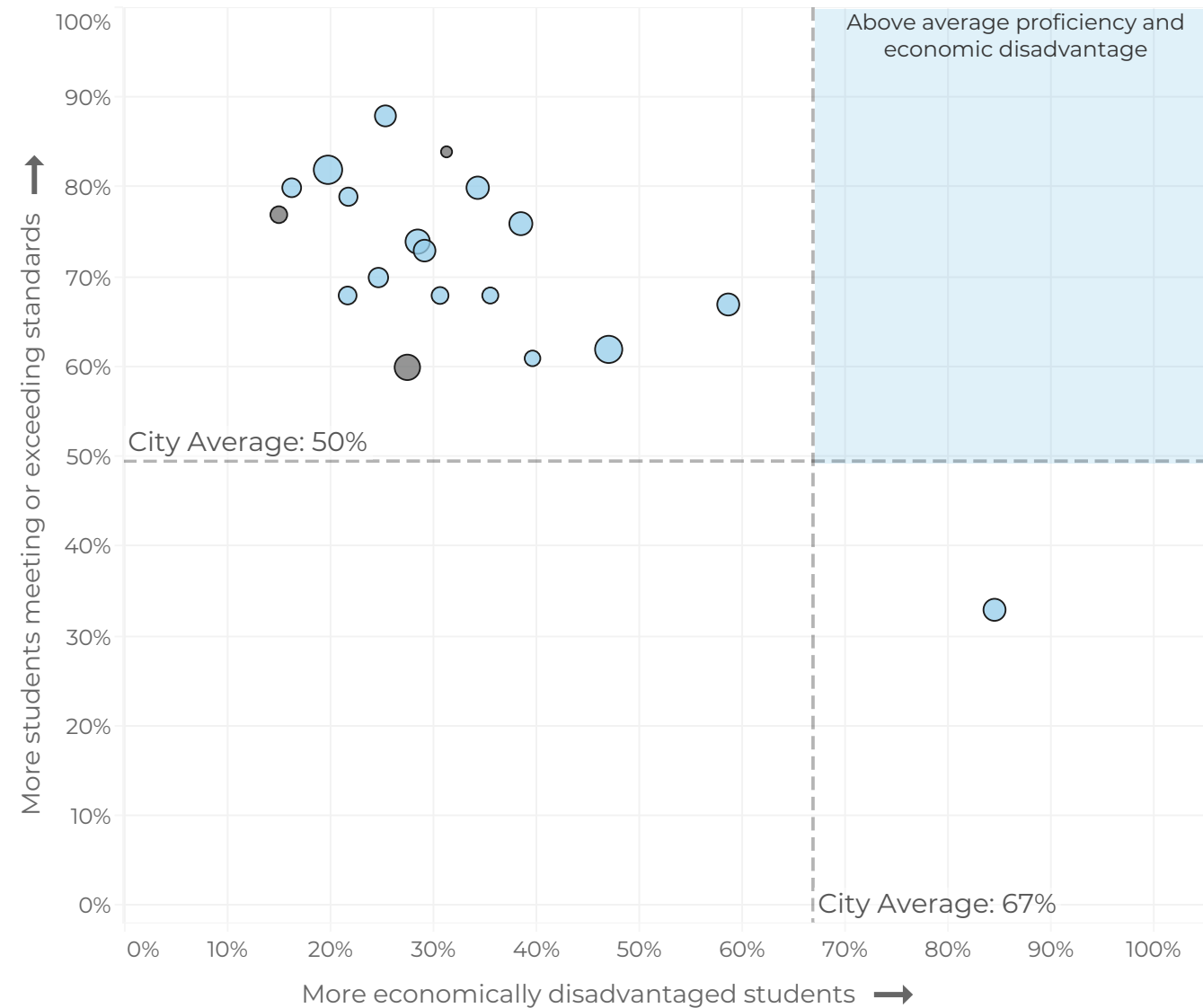

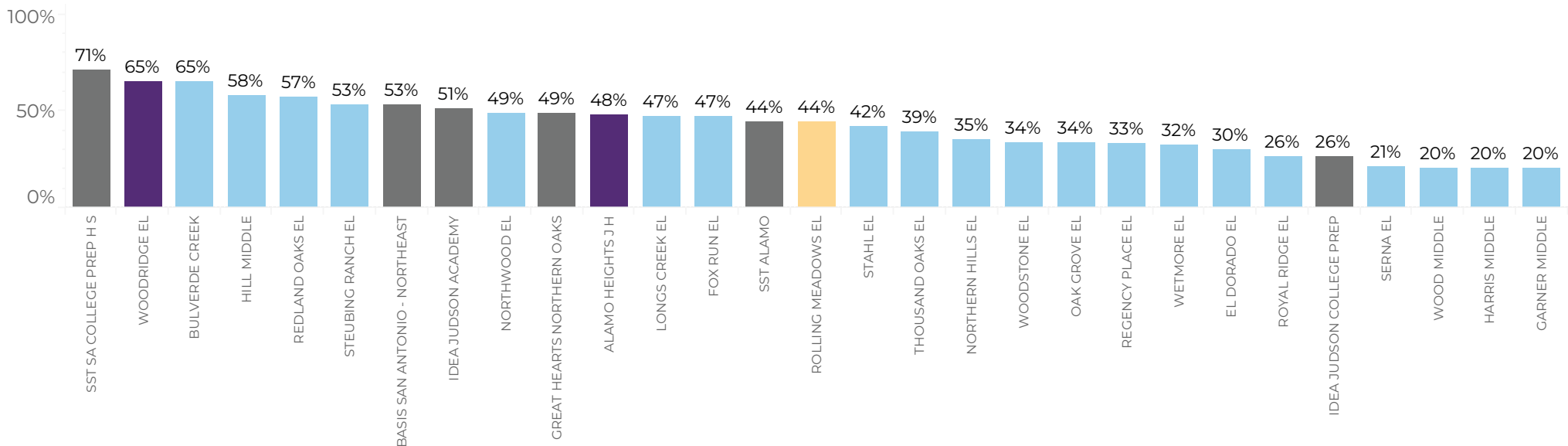


San Antonio City Council District 10

Percentage of Students at or Above Meets Grade Level Standard in Math

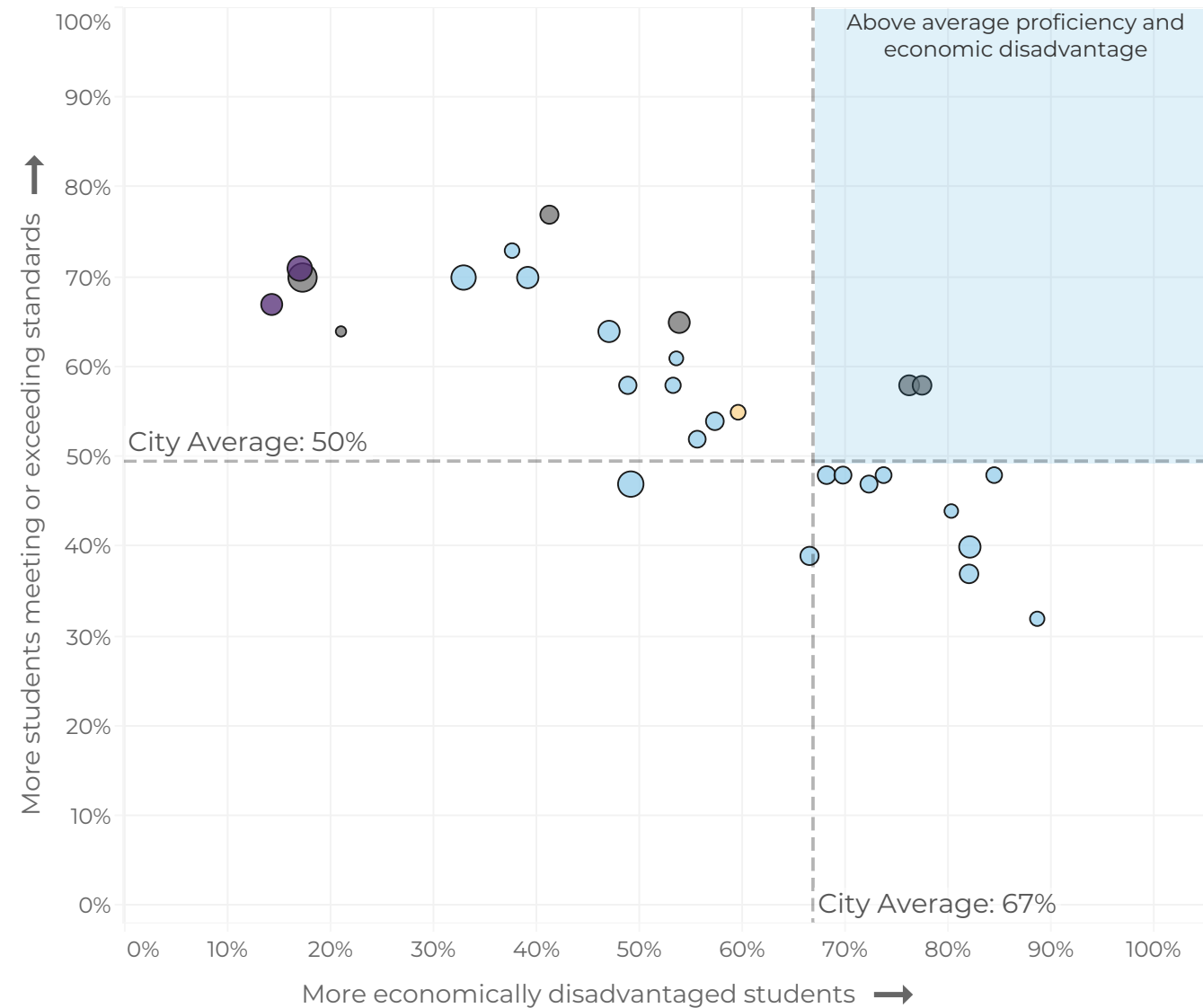

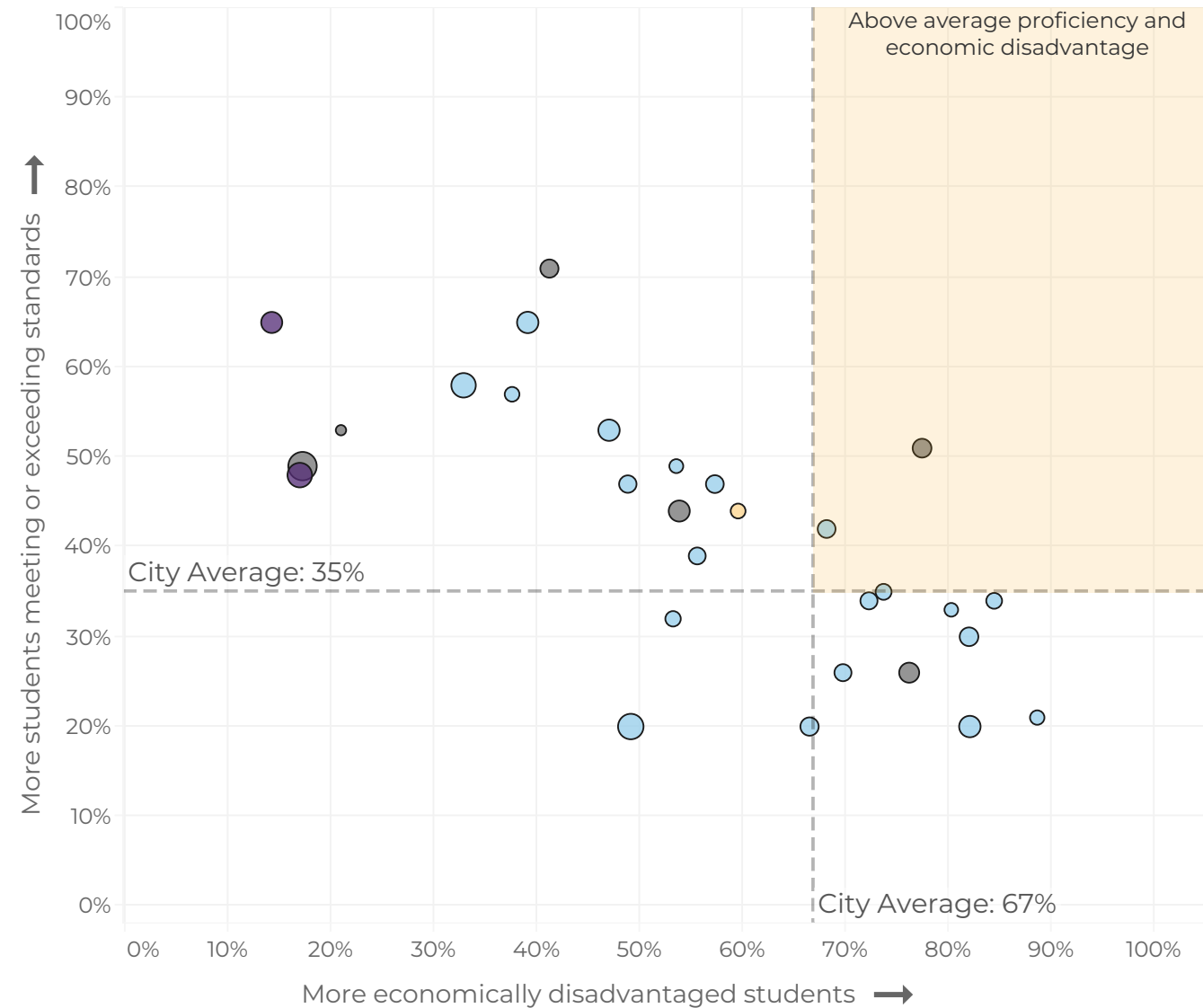

General Notes

Percentages indicate the percentage of assessments that received a 'Meets Grade Level' or above performance standard, across all STAAR 3-8 exams taken within a school or Council District.

Due to TEA delays, the "All Tests" numbers for 2026 do not include 5th or 8th grade Science exams. These results are expected to be released July 31. Enrollment data is from School Year 2025-2026 Student Program and Special Populations PEIMS Reports, as reported by TEA and found at: <https://tea.texas.gov/reports-and-data/student-data/standard-reports/peims-standard-reports>.

Geographic Boundaries

For each City Council District, geographic boundaries were determined using maps from <https://www.sanantonio.gov/council/find-my-council-member>, overlaid with school site locations from TEA's School Locator Map, found at <https://tea.texas.maps.arcgis.com/apps/webappviewer/index.html?id=51f0c8fa684c4d399d8d182e6edd5d97>.

All public schools open in School Year 2025-2026, containing at least one grade level within 3-8 and located within the geographic boundaries of the council district were included in published test results, except for those registered for AEA (Alternative Education Accountability).

All public schools open in School Year 2025-2026 and located within the geographic boundaries of the council district were included in enrollment counts regardless of grade levels or AEA designation.

Data Analysis

All test data is from TEA's Texas Assessment Research Portal found at <https://txresearchportal.com>. This released data is raw assessment data for all students regardless of school enrollment date and is not comparable to TEA accountability data tables or Texas Academic Performance Reports (TAPR).

School and Council District Data includes results from 3-8 STAAR subject exams (Reading, Math, Science and Social Studies). Results from STAAR 3-8 Alternate 2 exams, STAAR Spanish exams or STAAR End of Course exams were not included in this analysis.
